## **In Flanders Fields**



By John McCrae, May 1915

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die.
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

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#### Introduction

On 4<sup>th</sup> August 1914 war was declared with Germany. The British population were exhorted to do their patriotic duty and the people of Hatfield were no exception. The September 1914 issue of Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, called for calm, to avoid panic and to carry on as usual, but "First it is the duty of all young men to join some military force, a man clearly ought to do something for his country at a time like this". The magazine went on to print the "First List of Men Who Were Mobilised from Hatfield" this contained 111 names of the men, where they lived, and which regiment they joined. These lists were printed every month throughout the War, along with promotions, awards and casualties. Sadly for each month of the War there was also a "Roll of Honour" for those that had died. The Roll was often followed by a few sentences about each person who had been killed or there were letters sent home from army chaplains, commanding officers or comrades, these were framed in terms of the bravery shown by the men.

All the soldiers who fought in the Great War were heroes but for our research we have looked only at those who were killed in action or died as a result of going to war. These researches were based on the names of the soldiers in the Hatfield, "In Memoriam and Roll of Honour Album" and on the Hatfield, Hatfield Hyde, Lemsford, and Ponsbourne/Newgate Street War Memorials.

While the Hatfield "In Memoriam and Roll of Honour Album" endeavoured to cover the whole Parish of Hatfield the individual War Memorials honoured men from each village within the Parish.

At a public meeting held in August 1919, it was agreed to offer a choice of souvenirs to the men who had served, and to the families who had lost loved ones. This would be a choice of either an Album or Silver Matchbox inscribed with Hatfield 1914-1919. The criteria for receiving a souvenir would only be for men who left the Parish of Hatfield to go to war. There are 141 names in the Album, of men who were sadly killed or died. We however have researched 172 men of which 31 were not included in the Album.

#### For example:

**Edward Ingram**, Suffolk Regiment, is mentioned on the Hatfield War Memorial but not the Album. He had enlisted before coming to Hatfield, his family were newcomers to the area.

**George Edgar Nicholson**, South African Mounted Rifles, not a Hatfield man, but is mentioned on the Hatfield War memorial. His connection to Hatfield is his Father, Samuel Nicholson who was living at the Great Northern Hotel, Hatfield, at the time of his son's death on 24<sup>th</sup> April 1918.

There are two names of soldiers who went to War from the Parish of Hatfield mentioned in the "In Memoriam Album" who had been left off the Hatfield War Memorial, **Percy Frederick Bean & Henry W. Bishop**. Their names were added to the Memorial in November 2013.

Also included in this book are four names that are not in the Album or on any of the War Memorials, **P. A. Arnett** of the Canadian Infantry, nephew to a Mrs Allen, housekeeper at Hatfield House, **G.A. Powell** a New Zealander in the Royal Flying Corp, both are buried in St Luke's Churchyard, **W. Featherstone** of the Royal Flying Corp who at the time of his death, due to a flying accident, was living at North Place, Hatfield and Leading Seaman **G. A. Franks** who is buried in Lemsford churchyard.


The patriotism and heroism of all these men should not be forgotten.

Lived at 3<sup>rd</sup> Right of Way Hatfield

<u>Medal Card:</u> Awarded Victory Medal and British Medal. Also shows service in Hertfordshire Regiment, regimental No. 4861 & Bedfordshire Regiment, regimental No. 266562.

#### Further Research:

**1901 Census:** Ernest William Adams, age 9, born in Ware, Hertfordshire. His Father, Charles, was also born in Ware but his Mother, Maria was born in Hatfield. The family in 1901 were living in Ware. His Father was a Malt Maker.

**1911 Census:** Family living at 3 Collett Rd. Ware.

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, Oct 1914:** Ernest married Florence Wilson in Hatfield on Sept. 17<sup>th</sup> 1914. **Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, Jan 1916**: 17<sup>th</sup> list of men mobilised from Hatfield, *Adams, E. Newtown, 4/1<sup>st</sup> Herts. Regt.* 

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, Nov 1917**: Hatfield Roll of Honour "......most poignant loss is that of Ernest Adams, 1<sup>st</sup> Herts., Regt. of Newtown, the news of whose death was received by his wife while she was away in the Isolation Hosp., and was thus deprived of the comfort of her child and relations".

Herts. Advertiser, 27.10.1917: Pte Ernest W Adams, aged 24?, Herts. Regt., husband of Mrs Florence Adams, New Town Hatfield and son of Mrs Adams of 3 Collett Rd, Ware, was killed in action on September 23<sup>rd</sup>. He joined the army in April 1916 and was formerly a boot-maker employed by Mr Burgess, Hatfield, and Mr Martin, George Street, St. Albans. He was wounded in the spine in January but returned to France in July. The widow is left with one little daughter. Deceased's brother, Charles, of the Somerset Light Infantry, (late Herts. Regt) was killed on Sept 16<sup>th</sup> 1916, another brother has been missing since April 14<sup>th</sup> and two other brothers are

A comrade in the course of a letter writes 'My company have asked me to write to you and express how very sorry they are to lose him as he was a good comrade and a good soldier, always cheerful and bright and willing to do whatever he was asked to, but, thank God, he died a true Englishman, giving his life for his king and country.'

Florence (now called Flora) remarried in 1924 to a Walter E. Hart in Hatfield. The address given for Flora on the CWGC entry appears to be incorrect as there is no 43<sup>rd</sup> Rightaway. It could be number 4, The Third Right of Way.

**1901 Census:** A William James Andrews, age 9 and born in Welwyn, is living at 7 Frampton Street, Hertford with his Father and Mother. His Father, Arthur, was a journeyman baker who was born in Hatfield. His Mother named Elizabeth was born in Welwyn.

**1911 Census:** William is still living at 7 Frampton Street, Hertford. Only his Mother and William are listed at this address. William is now a Trimmer at a chamois leather skin mills.

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, September 1916:** Hatfield Roll of Honour - "William Andrews has died of wounds in hospital in France. He was not strictly speaking of Hatfield but often came to see his Aunts who lived here, and to whom his death comes as a terrible shock. He was a good soldier, as many in the Regiment could testify. Much sympathy to his Father and Aunts in their great need."

**1901 Census:** Francis, age four, is living with his family at 18, Primrose Cottages, Hatfield. Father, William H. Angell, a car man labourer, Mother's name is Sarah A. Angell. He has six siblings.

**1911 Census**: Francis, age 14 and at school is still living with his family, now in a cottage in Hatfield Park.

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine April 1916:** 20<sup>th</sup> list of men mobilised from Hatfield - "Angell, Francis T., The Park, 3/1<sup>st</sup> Herts. Regt" Francis died only four months after being mobilised. **Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine January 1917:** Hatfield Roll of Honour – Killed in Action – Francis Angell.


**Canada Remembers Div. Veterans Affairs Canada:** Via email, "According to his attestation papers he was born in Shallow Lake, Ontario on January 16 1897. He listed farming as his occupation. He enlisted in the army on April 1, 1915 in Brandon, Manitoba. His Father was living in Manitoba at the time of enlistment. According to the CEF Roll of Honour, he died of wounds in England. It is quite possible he was recuperating in a hospital nearby and he eventually passed away from his injuries".

#### Herts Advertiser, 24.6.1916: Arnett Funeral

Military Funeral – Pte Peter Allan Arnett was buried at Hatfield Cemetery with military honours on Tuesday afternoon. Deceased who was a nephew of Mrs Allen, housekeeper at Hatfield House, was only 19 years of age and belonged to the 27<sup>th</sup> Bn. 6<sup>th</sup> Brigade, 2<sup>nd</sup> Canadian Division. He arrived in England from Canada in September of last year and after training at Shorncliffe, was drafted to the front, on Feb 16th last. In the recent severe fighting he was badly wounded in the thigh on Sunday week? and died at the Ontario Military Hospital in Orpington Gate on Friday of last week. The body was brought to Hatfield by train and was met by an escort of Royal Engineers and a firing party of 14 men of No 4 Company, Quartermaster Sergt Panter? and Sergt Bayliss. In addition to the relatives, Lady Salisbury and several members of the R Es and Volunteers followed the cortege. The service was impressively conducted by the Rev. G F Baxter and on its conclusion the usual volleys were fired and the Bugler George Bucklar? of the Hatfield Troop of Boy Scouts sounded the "Last Post".

Newport (St Woolos) Cemetery is situated in Monmouthshire; there are 167 Commonwealth burials from the 1914-18 War

**1891 Census:** Albert, age 8, is living at Tyler's Causeway, Hatfield, with his parents John and Elizabeth and his four siblings. Father, John, is an agricultural labourer.

**1901 Census:** Albert, age 18, is still living with his now widowed Father and 3 siblings at Tyler's Causeway. Albert is a hay carter, his Father, aged 73, is listed as living on own means.

**1911 Census:** Albert, age 28, is still living at Tyler' Causeway. Albert and his Father (82) are listed as labourers.

Hatfield Parish Council Souvenir Committee Ledger: An "In Memoriam\_& Roll of Honour Album" was ordered for the relatives/friends of Albert Arnold; address given was Tylers Causeway, Newgate St.

**The National Roll Of The Great War 1914-1918 section V, Luton:** He volunteered in Oct. 1914 and in the following year was drafted to Mesopotamia; he did valuable work in the field of war and was engaged in many important battles that led to the capture of Bagdad. Whilst on active service there he contracted a fever and died on July 19<sup>th</sup> 1917. He lived at 2, Lea Mead Hatfield.

<u>Medal Card:</u> Awarded the Victory Medal and British Medal. Additional information - Rifle Brigade, Northumberland Fusiliers, Regt. No. 261, 26939.

#### **Further Research:**

**1881 Census:** A Joseph Austin, age 2, is living with his parents, Jesse and Sarah and 6 siblings, at Roestock, near Hatfield. Father, Jesse, is a bricklayer.

**1891Census:** A Conrad Joseph Austin, aged 12, is living with his family in Newtown, Hatfield. Father, Jesse Austin, is a bricklayer/carpenter. Mother, Sarah, is not listed.

Conrad married in Hatfield in the summer of 1908

**1911 Census:** A Joseph Austin is living with his wife Edith in Newtown, Hatfield. He is working as a bricklayer (House builder).

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, December 1914:** 4<sup>th</sup> List of Men Mobilised from Hatfield - *Austin, Conrad Joseph -Leamead Cottages – National Reserve.* Conrad must have been about 35 when he was mobilised. **Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, September 1917:** Roll of Honour – Conrad Austin, Northumberland Fusiliers.

#### Herts. Advertiser, 18.8.17: Hatfield NCO's Death in Mesopotamia

Mrs Austin, wife of Sergt. Conrad Joseph Austin of Hatfield has received the sad news of her husband's death from the effects of heat stroke at the ? Hospital at ? (Mesopotamia). Sergt. Austin, who was in his 38th Year was the youngest son of Mr James Austin of Newtown Hatfield and had been connected with the Herts. Regt. for a good many years, He, with his elder brother Tom, were among the Herts. Volunteers who went out to South Africa where the latter died from ? fever. Sergt. Austin was a member of the National Reserve and for a short time did guard duty at Welwyn Viaduct. He was then sent to India and after remaining there about twelve months was drafted to the Northumberland Fusiliers of which he was the youngest member and sent to Mesopotamia. In civil life Sergt. Austin was employed on the GNR. He leaves a widow and two young children to mourn their loss.

**1911 Census:** Cyril now 18 is still living with his parents in Park Street. He is now working as a clerk. Father Josiah, is now a bricklayer, his Mother, Rhoda, is still listed as a dressmaker.

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, January1917:** 17<sup>th</sup> list of men mobilised from Hatfield, - *Cyril John Austin – Fore Street – 12<sup>th</sup> London Ranger.* 

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, June 1918:** Hatfield Roll of Honour, - Among those who have laid down their lives for their country, we do not think that there is one who has laid down his life with a clearer conscience, or a brighter faith than Cyril Austin. Only the other day he was with us with his buoyant presence, having obtained the commission which he well earned. We have only lately heard thro' a side channel, how great his influence had been with his fellow-men especially in the direction of their presence at the Holy Communion- and now his works do follow him. Our deepest sympathies go with his parents and Miss Smith. We are allowed to publish the following:-

Dear Mrs Austin,

I very much regret to inform you that your son, Lieut. C. J. Austin, 1<sup>st</sup> Kings Own Regiment, was killed last night during an enemy bombardment. May I offer you in the name of all ranks of the Battalion our deepest sympathy at your sad loss, and assure you that we also feel his loss very deeply. As Battalion Signal Officer, your son lived at Headquarters, so that I had every opportunity of seeing and appreciating his very excellent work at all times. He was an officer I can ill afford to lose. Apart from his work, he was invaluable in many ways. Always cheerful and willing, he was a great favourite with all ranks, always having a cheery word for the men and ready to lend a helping hand. Throughout the recent hard fighting he has never failed, and I have every reason to be grateful for his energy and zeal. His body is being taken back to-night and I have arranged for him to be buried some miles from the line. Again with expression of the deepest sympathy at your loss, I remain yours sincerely,

'<u>A plucky Hatfield Lad'</u>: Hatfield is again honoured by the success of another of her brave lads. Sgt. C J Austin who enlisted on January 1<sup>st</sup> 1916 in the ......the County of London Regiment holds an excellent record of service. He went out to France in June and in the following September received his first stripe. The next month saw him become full Corporal and on Feb. 13<sup>th</sup> of this year he was promoted to the rank of Sergeant.

As Lance Corporal Austin he especially distinguished himself. He took part in an attack on October 7<sup>th</sup> behaving with great gallantry. The attack commenced at 1.45 p.m. and after remaining in a shell hole for five hours exposed to bomb fire he pluckily retrieved a Lewis gun. Whilst engaged in this perilous act he heard the cry of a wounded comrade. Again he went forward for a distance of some twenty yards; but failing to achieve his object he was obliged to return. Nothing daunted, he made a second attempt, this time accompanied by another soldier and under terrific gunfire they succeeded in rescuing their pal. During the same night Austin held 200 yards of trench with sixteen men. His bravery, devotion to duty, and good conduct, have been such as to merit the acknowledgement of the commanding officer of .......the London Division in the following words, "Your Commanding Officer and the Brigade Commander have informed me that you have distinguished yourself by your conduct in the Field. I have read their report with much pleasure."

Sgt Austin is enjoying a month's leave at the expiration of which he will join the OTC preparatory to taking up a commission.

Mr and Mrs J Austin of the Town Lodge, Hatfield have learned from the War Office that their younger son, Second Lieut. Cyril J Austin, King's Own Royal Lancs. Regt., was killed in action on May 17<sup>th</sup>. Lieut. Austin who would have been 26 years of age on July 4<sup>th</sup>, was in civil life employed with the engineering firm of Messrs Cooper Stewart, London. He joined the 12 London Regt. (The Rangers) in November 1915 and went to France in the following June. He received special mention for gallant conduct on the field and on the recommendation of his officers returned to England in February 1917 to take up a commission. He was trained in Ireland and in September last was gazetted to the King's Own Royal Lancs. Regt., with which he has served in France since October 22<sup>nd</sup> last. Much sympathy is felt for Mr and Mrs Austin in their very sad bereavement.



<u>Further Research</u>:- There is some confusion as to the identity of Albert A Baker. We believe that the Albert Baker on this CWGC entry is the same person listed on the Hatfield War Memorial. In 1866 a Henry Baker and a Sarah Warner were married in Hatfield; this would tie in with the names of Albert's parents on the CWGC entry.

**1881 & 1891 Census:** An Albert A Baker is living with his parents and siblings in Mill Green, Hatfield, at the Mill Green Beer House (1881) which became known as the "Green Man" (1891). Albert's Father, Henry, was a farm labourer; his Mother, Sarah, in 1891 was a beer house keeper. By 1891 Albert was working as a farm labourer

Albert cannot be found on the 1901 & 1911 census. He may well have emigrated.

<u>Seaforth highlanders:</u> Upon hearing of the proclamation of war with Germany on 4 August 1914 Lieutenant Colonel Edwards-Leckie, commanding officer of the Seaforth Highlanders,

immediately offered the regiment for overseas service. His request was denied, and instead the regiment provided 25 officers and 514 men for the 16th Battalion Canadian Expeditionary Force, forming almost half the

battalion. While waiting for permission for the Seaforths to go overseas the regiment recruited and deployed an additional 41 officers and 1637 men to numerous battalions.

Finally on 18 July Major J.A.Clark was appointed as the commander of the 72nd Battalion CEF Seaforth Highlanders of Canada and ordered to begin training for overseas service. The regiment travelled east through Ottawa to the United Kingdom and on 18 August 1916, the Seaforths were in France. Receiving the number 72nd Battalion made the Seaforths the only Canadian regiment in World War I to deploy with its traditional regimental number as its CEF battalion number.

Very sympathetic letters have been received by Mrs Basill from her boy's comrades, one of whom wrote "He was one of the youngest lads in our squad but his age certainly did not make him any the less efficient or lacking in spirit. He made the supreme sacrifice on the morning of the 8<sup>th</sup> April at about 10 o'clock. As he spent twelve months in our company we can understand in a small measure of your loss He died as he lived, a soldier in every sense of the word, and was buried with full military honours, along with five of his mates, who were killed at the same time" Another wrote "Your dear son's parcel arrived here quite safely on Easter Monday but unfortunately after he had been killed in action. He was a great chum of ours, very calm,? and collected and always looked upon as a true friend. The greatest sympathy is sent to yourself and family from all his comrades.



Potters Bar. His Regiment is the now Loyal North Lancashire No. 23499. 11/3/1918 died from a shell wound to the abdomen. Percy's personal effects were sent to Mrs E. Bean, (Grandmother) Robley or Robby Park Farm. There is some confusion when Percy died; a telegram was sent to next of kin on 16/3/1918 - P.F. Bean is dangerously ill at 51 Casualty Clearing Station, France. Shell wound to abdomen. This was addressed to Bean, Kentish Lane, Bell Bar, Hatfield. The telegram was not delivered recipient gone away. His Grandmother is living with her daughter Ethel at Robley or Robby Park Farm.



Private Berry was the second son of Mr W J Berry, newsagent, of Newtown, Hatfield, and joined the Beds Regt in June 1916. He was invalided home with trench fever and rheumatism and again with wounds in his shoulder and knee. He returned to France on Jan 1<sup>st</sup> this year. Deceased leaves a widow and two young children.



He was 5ft. 9in. tall, with good physical development and certified fit for military service. Henry had previously served with the "Coldstream Guards 2 years, South African (1) year, Yeomanry Herts." He re-enlisted on the 17<sup>th</sup> September 1915, originally with the Herts. Yeomanry, no. 5548, but was transferred to Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, no. 28678 on 10/09/16 just after arriving in France. Shortly after this he received a gunshot wound to his hand and was gassed, he was sent back to England and discharged on 19.12.16, no longer fit for war service.

Medical Examiner's Report: "In action Sept 1916 – Somme front was wounded at Flers on 16<sup>th</sup> Sept 1916, GSW hand – after which he has never been well. He was sick; attributes it to getting a certain amount of gas, as tear gas shells were bursting around, was not wearing his gas helmet at the time. Cough and shortness of breath present, wheezing audible. Face rather puffy. Physical signs in chest of emphysema and bronchitis still present. Pulse small. Disability evident. Deafness in left ear and left hand still stiff. G.S.W. and gassing not permanent, probable duration six months. Total disablement at present."

Henry was awarded a pension of 25/- (shillings). He was regularly re-examined and pension adjusted. His last examination was on 12.10.18, "treatment for tuberculosis should be continued", awarded 22/- and 17/6d for his five children. Henry died on 11<sup>th</sup> November 1918. (The last day of the war)

His wife had died and at least two of the children were living with his sister-in-law in Church Street.





Patrick Caesar lived his short life chiefly in our midst. He was known to many parishioners; he was respected and admired, nay loved by a very large number. His sterling, upright character, his unfaltering Christianity, his strict adhesion to duty – all combined to impress those around him, unobtrusive though his example ever was. When the fact of his heroic death became known, there was a feeling – grief for him and for those he loved, to whom he was all in all. Whether at school or in the office or later on at Oxford, everywhere Patrick Caesar was loved and followed, for his influence was always for good. The war broke out and he joined the Army, surrendering for the time being his dearest hope of entering Holy Orders, and there too this leading characteristic of influencing men continued. His Mother hears that when he was killed in a great advance on the 14<sup>th</sup> July, while leading his men to victory, officers and men alike mourned his loss most deeply; they recognised his integrity and his splendid soldierly qualities. What his loss must be to those who are left behind in that desolated home, one dare not think. His blameless life and glorious death will remain in our memories

as an example of Christian endeavour and Christian sacrifice; his good influence on the men and boys of Hatfield will live as long as memory lasts. And in the great Life Beyond, he is now by prayer united to us, and we can be sure that his voice is not still and that his spirit is ever pleading for those whom he loved and among whom he dwelt. On July 24<sup>th</sup> there was a Celebration of the Holy Communion at the Parish Church to which Lieutenant Caesar's friends were asked to come and pray for him; this many did. Appended is a letter received by his Mother from the Chaplain, describing what occurred; truly his was a gallant death.

Julv 18th

Dear Mrs Caesar, - In the attack on the 14<sup>th</sup> July, we gained a victory but suffered some loss, and amongst those whom we could ill spare is your son. We found him by the enemy wire over which his men had to get. A machine gun swept the ground in front and your son was killed almost at the moment of victory. He was a fine fellow, and those of us who remain are feeling very sad about it. He died a soldier's death leading his men up the slope of the hill. I have known him from the old Aldershot days and he was always the same quiet, steady man, who in a tight place would act best for his men without thought for his own danger. Will you please accept my own, and the sympathy of those who are left, in your loss. — I am yours sincerely P. Erskine Lee, C.F."

#### Herts. Advertiser, 29.7.1916:

Lieut. Pat Caesar of the Shropshire Light Infantry the only son of Mrs Caesar of Galley Croft has been killed in the recent fighting in France. Previous to the war he was well known for the energetic part he took in the social and church work of the parish and was also a prominent figure in local cricket. He was studying at Oxford with the intention of taking Holy Orders. A special service for the repose of his soul was held in the Parish Church on Monday morning. Much sympathy is felt in the parish for his widowed mother and her daughters.

Captain (Major) Edward Hildred Hanbury CARLILE, Killed in Action 22nd March 1918, aged 37.

Captain Carlile served in the Hertfordshire Yeomanry in England until posted to the front. He landed in France on the 19th January 1918 and joined the battalion on the front lines the following day. Two months later he was posted as missing during the opening phase of the German offensive and was later confirmed as having been killed on the 22nd March. He was the only son of Colonel, Sir Hildred Carlile, 1st Bart., C.B.E. and the late Lady Carlile, of Ponsbourne Park near Hertford and the husband of Ruth M. Carlile (later Mrs. Preston). He has no known grave but is remembered on the Arras memorial to the missing, on the Hertfordshire Yeomanry panel





## 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. G. E. Cecil, 2 Bn. Grenadier Guards

George Edward Cecil, born on 9 September 1895 the son of Lord and Lady Edward Cecil, had a life-long ambition to soldier. After Winchester College (1909-12) he passed into Sandhurst as a King's Cadet aged 17 and was gazetted Ensign in his father's old regiment in February 1914. Still only 18, he went to France with his Battalion on 13 August 1914. It was among the first to arrive.

At first, Cecil acted as Orderly Officer to General Scott Kerr but had command of a platoon by the time the Guards crossed the Aisne at Pommiers during the Retreat. Exhausted by days of marching, 2Bn. Grenadiers were at rest when orders came in soon after midnight on 1 September to take up a rear-guard position just north of Vivieres. No casualties resulted from the first encounter with enemy patrols at first light and the Battalion retired in good order into the forest of Villers-Cotterets.

There was an outburst of firing at about 11am which soon became chaotic forest fighting at point blank range. Part of No 4 Company made a counter attack, suffering badly in the melee and most of its officers and men were either killed, wounded or missing, among them George Cecil. He was killed leading a bayonet charge, sword in hand.

The story of this engagement and its casualties appears in "Fifteen Rounds a Minute", the diaries of Major 'Ma' Jeffreys (J M Craster, McMillan 1976). This also gives a fascinating account of the visit to the battlefield later that same month by Cecil's mother, and the subsequent visit by Lord Killanin in November 1914 to locate and exhume all those buried in a pit after the action of 1 September. The CWGC burial report confirms the facts. Killanin's party found 94 men, recorded their details where possible and re-buried them under a cross, on the spot. This later became the Guards Cemetery. They found the four officers who had been killed and were able to identify them by clothing and personal effects; 2/Lt Cecil being identified by the initials on his vest. The

officers were originally buried in a hastily purchased plot in the cemetery at Villers-Cotterets but after the War their remains were brought back to join their men.

In 1916 Lady Edward Cecil gave the Cecil Range to Winchester in memory of her son and this is still in use. Later she erected a stone memorial by the roadside to commemorate the action of 1 September. On the front is inscribed 'PASSANT ARRETE-TOI' below a carving in relief of a weeping women standing by a soldier's grave. On the back, the inscription reads:

'IN HONOUR OF THE OFFICERS AND / MEN OF THE GRENADIER COLDSTREAM / AND IRISH GUARDS WHO FELL NEAR / THIS SPOT ON 1st SEPTEMBER 1914. / THIS MEMORIAL WAS PLACED HERE BY / THE MOTHER OF ONE OF THEM AND / IS ESPECIALLY DEDICATED TO SECOND / LIEUTENANT GEORGE EDWARD CECIL' Although much in the style of CWGC architecture the memorial was privately built and cared for until 1978 when the Grenadiers paid for the removal of a yew hedge and a reduction in the area to be maintained. They then provided capital to provide income for future maintenance and the memorial has remained in the care of CWGC ever since.

### Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, May 1915: Extracts from Letters from the Front-

April 16<sup>th</sup> 1915

........One gets so deadly sick of the sounds of guns and rifles....... It's much more interesting here. In this position the Germans seem to surround one on all sides. One is penisulated almost. At night the star shells go up on all sides. The ground is rather flat and woody, so observing has to be done from the firing trenches by means of a periscope. The view is very limited in a periscope which makes observing very difficult, as unless the rounds burst fairly accurately, one misses them altogether. There was great excitement in T's column the other day; a couple of Taubes came over and dropped bombs on to some of the wagons which were waiting in the square of the town. They had several horses killed and some men wounded......

April 23<sup>rd</sup> 1915

.......We observe from the fire trenches....I don't know if I told you that before.....which is interesting but rather useless as you can see very little from them except the German trench about a mile away.......It is sometimes very hard to believe we are still at war. One goes through a delightful pine wood to the trenches. Everything is quiet except for an occasional zeep of a bullet and the twitter of birds. Everything is getting green and budding. Everything suggests newness — a fresh start. One goes a little further on. All the trees are smashed by shrapnel; there are shell holes full of stagnant water. The smell is a Rifle Van Wombley one. A little further on are the trenches where one finds a body of men intent on destroying life. In front of the trench some dead Frenchmen, I think they must be a relic from last year. A little on is a German trench and beyond that is a district which one speculates about perpetually. One takes the bearings of even the trees in order to gain some idea of the order of things. It's all very interesting and absorbing........The day before yesterday the Boches dropped about 60 6in. shells round the Batteries about here. .........They contain cyanide and potassium or something like it, the effect was rather demoralizing. One's eyes began to smart and in a short time no one could see. In one Battery the shells fell fairly close and some of the men became unconscious. In other cases the men were violently sick. I think it is a terribly mean method of war.

## **Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine July 1915:** Extracts from Letters from the Front

June 6<sup>th</sup> 1915

....We have had a divisional move to a very quiet spot about the centre of the English lines. Nothing has happened here for months. The trenches are magnificent constructions about 300 to 600 yards away from the Germans, (though at one point the trenches are only about 30 yards apart and one can hear the Germans laughing and talking.) They actually have flower gardens in them. Water is laid on and all the trenches are carefully paved with bricks. The communication trench leading to the reserve trench is large enough to take horses down. Very different from where we come from......

18<sup>th</sup> June 1915

.....I think you must really be having a more interesting time now than we are. Here it is very quiet. Our only excitement was a German mine blowing up a portion of our trenches. Otherwise everything is very peaceful. I suppose it is munitions or rather the lack of munitions that is causing the Russians to retreat. It is rather depressing though. The pity of it is we cannot make a bigger effort owing to our now acknowledged shortage.......

21<sup>st</sup> June 1915

The war was going to be over the middle of this month and as it won't I think everyone is more or less depressed, especially as things seem to be going fairly well with the Germans. One redeeming feature is that their victory over the Russians is not due to their own frightfulness or power but rather to the sudden weakness of the Russians. After all the Bosches tried for five awful weeks to get through at Ypres and failed; while this second battle of Ypres was going on they lost ground at other parts of the Western line. Then when at last they gave up, they are able to drive the Russians helter skelter, who had only spades and picks and bayonets to fight with. Apparently people at home are saying Neuve Chapelle was a mistake. It was not. It was a failure which did more towards the completion of the war even so than all the winter campaign. Of course here we are more bored than depressed. We have to be hopelessly vigilant which is very wearying. I must say I should like to get away though from the sounds of war and responsibilities it entails.......You talk about a recruiting meeting held in the open and that men had not joined yet. I would not worry them to join. Men who always consider

themselves and their likes and dislikes, whose gods are themselves, are to put it vulgarly, no dam good in a show where every man has to sacrifice his likes continually and often himself after.

Marseilles, Nov 18, 1915

.....I don't know how long I shall be here, perhaps a very short time. Nothing is known .......This place is most interesting. The streets are crowded all day and up to 1a.m. It is the most cosmopolitan crowd I've seen. French, Moroccans, Turcos, Greeks, Serbs, English, Indians, Americans.......All the French soldiery wear medals. You see people who look like Turks wearing the Croix de la Guerre, and practically everybody wears the Legion of Honour. A few wounded but not many, French soldiers with their blue helmets. English soldiers looking dazed but happy. Much Entente Cordiale. Always 'Abas les Boches but thank heaven for the War, it brings such trade to the belle ville. There is one music hall still going, that had a Franco-Britannic piece with a comic Scotchman by a bad French actor. I was with a Cameronian officer at the time so par politesse did not laugh.

Salonika 27<sup>th</sup> January 1916

Here it is very much colder. The night it freezes and there is snow on most of the hills, while the mountain of the gods is lovely and very reminiscent of Lunn's Tours to Switzerland. A very bleak country, brown in the distance, and dried grass when you get close; earth a red colour, well described by khaki. Valleys are traced by deep mullahs, which are too deep to get a horse over. I think I'm in a position to picturefy, as I've only seen one day here. There are the wind and rain to relate. They say the wind is like that of Marseilles and the rain equatorial, but that I will leave to another letter.....What roguish lot these Greeks seem and look. They are very picturesque and poverty stricken in appearance, but perhaps it is the latter quality which makes them seem so bandittesque. They say it is wise to carry a revolver always, but I think a knife would be more efficient and in keeping with the habit of the country. They have a most convenient multiplication system for foreigners — 3times 4 is 13, and 6times 3 is 19, and so on. They will argue they're right till you have to give in, because that time is money is a motto reversed with them (in meaning only)........

## Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine April 1916: Extracts from Letters from the Front –

Near Salonika, 8<sup>th</sup> February 1916

.....We've been away the last week on a reconnaissance, which was interesting but not very exciting. The Bulgars are miles away and we are just sitting down, doing nothing as usual. The country was rather lovely; we were quite close to the nearest lake. The hills are full of shrubs of all kinds, with crocuses and other flowers just starting: the plains are marshy, with any amount of wild fowl. Some members of our party had guns they brought in France; they supplied the larder with geese, duck, snipe and woodcock. They say there are wolves; we saw none, but we heard jackals every night. Partridges, too with magpies, owls and hawks, besides lots of smaller birds are plentiful. There are no roads to shout about and villages are small and desolate. They have churches which are hard to recognise as such, and quaint-looking old priests with a kind of top hat and flowing robes. The houses are all of stone and mud and very squat. The family pets – such as pigs, donkeys, ponies, cows and hens, turkeys and ducks – stroll about the villages, making them look homely. Tiny donkeys are used for carrying huge bundles of wood or hay, etc., pannier fashion. Their women all wear trousers like the men; the only difference is that whereas the men's are baggy where they sit down and tight around the calves, the women's are baggy all the way down. The weather has been good, and with the exception of one day which was very wet. Cold nights and hot days. The plains are planted with maize. Old Greek is quite like the modern and a very useful beginning; I find I can get what I want nearly always. The men always look like bandits. It is very curious there are Greek villages, Turkish and Bulgarians, quite close to each other; they all talk their own language, and employ them all in making roads. We arrived back yesterday, and to-day I went to S......; a more grubby crowd I've seldom seen. There are lots of women still veil their faces. I can quite sympathize if they have fine eyes and nothing else. Some of the folk are fair. Red hair is not extraordinary, though black hair and nasty low faces are more common. Masses of Greek soldiery, looking very dirty, stroll the town. In the back streets all windows are latticed, a relic of the Turks, like the minarets, which are certainly very pretty, they say there is a Church and Mosque which are worth visiting, but I have not seen them yet. From all appearances it John Cecil, 19<sup>th</sup> Brigade, R.F.A seems likely we shall be here for some time doing absolutely nothing.

15<sup>th</sup> March 1916

......I don't think I told you about the tortoises, there are a lot here. You find shells all over the place. Our General has a theory that they change shells and that those we find are to let or perhaps are in insanitary surroundings. They are quite interesting animals. The doctor left one in a box over a week and it was quite cheery when discovered. They are said to feed on insects and immature plants, they catch flies by coming up and out of their shells so slowly that the fly cannot see them coming. Besides them there are lizards which are very hard to catch; besides it's undignified. The birds here are numerous, from the crow to the golden eagle who flies for the hour without winking an eyelid or flapping a wing. Herons too, are comic birds. I was quite excited though when my groom told me he had seen an ostrich sitting in a tree. He meant a stork, but it wasn't even that, only a lowly heron. I have spent and shall spend most of my time surveying. It's quite interesting examining the country you hope, I should and ought to say, might bombard one day. The place is the site of the final stand of the Turks before they were driven into the Chalcedon promontory or whatever they call it. There are all the trenches and the graveyards. Masses of folk must have been killed here to judge by the size of them. It's really a lovely country. There is splendid riding and jolly hills. Many flowers I've never seen before and lots I have. I found a spring onion growing wild today, a relic of past civilization. The villages are only half habited; many of the houses are in ruins. I expect in the time of the Turks this was a very prosperous place. At present cultivation is carried on in a very homely manner – a wooden plough drawn by a yoke of oxen or buffalo. They only plough about two or three inches and then in wonderfully wiggly lines. There are Greek relics, gold ornaments have been found when digging trenches but I've no luck. I've only seen a few odd bits of pillars, they might have been drain pipes but I don't think so, as this is not a sanitary land. The people are quite friendly as a rule but very wiffy so I don't like holding prolonged attempts at conversational intercourse. The children are very pretty but beauty in a woman is a thing of the past, at ten years old. Some of the boys have truly Grecian features; one generally takes that as a sign of rascality and a cheat....... John Cecil, 19<sup>th</sup> Brigade R.F.A.

In these* pages it is especially grievous to record the death of a third son of the late Rector and Lady Florence. Capt. *John A. Gascoyne-Cecil, M.C.* to give his full title to the boy whom we all think of as "Jack" has proved himself worthy of the name he bore and has brought fresh honours to it. Already a Territorial officer before the outbreak of War, he was one of those mobilised at the outbreak of War and at Christmas 1914, he was sent to the front with his battery. He was mentioned in despatches after the 2<sup>nd</sup> battle of Ypres and eventually transferred to the Salonika front. It is believed, an open secret, that having obtained leave to return to England, he insisted on being sent to the Western Front that he might experience the brunt of the fighting, not considering that his was sufficiently arduous task in the Balkans. Within 3 weeks of his return to France he was killed by a shell while reconnoitring a very forward position.

This was all of a piece with his intensely virile energy, which would have carried him far in life: he was absolutely fearless physically and morally, very tenacious of his purpose and of an affection which accords generally with men of a softer mode. He left his mark in whatever society he was in and we can believe that "Officers, N.C.O.s and men placed thorough reliance on his leadership which was of a very high order". This is the price which we shall have paid for peace, the very best that England had to give.

The deepest sympathy of the inhabitants of Hatfield pours out to the Bishop of Exeter and Lady Florence Cecil in the loss of their third son, Capt John Cecil, who was killed in France on August 27<sup>th</sup>. Capt Cecil joined the Army

immediately war broke out. In the early days of the war he saw service in France with the Artillery and from France was drafted to Salonica and Mesopotamia. He only returned to France a short time before his death.

Capt J A Gascoyne-Cecil. Killed seventeen days after going to France.

Capt J A Gascoyne Cecil, M C, third son of the Bishop of Exeter and Lady Florence Cecil and nephew of the Marquess and Marchioness of Salisbury, whose death in action was announced in our last issue was born in March 1895 (?) and was educated at Westminster, where he became ? and represented the school at Aldershot and in the Public Schools gymnastics competition. He was employed at Vickers Works and was a Territorial officer in a Howitzer battery composed chiefly of Vickers' staff for a year before the outbreak of war. At Christmas 1914, the Brigade of which his battery was a unit was converted into a Divisional Ammunitions column and sent to the front. Soon after, however, he succeeded in getting attached to a Regular battery and was given a section. He remained in his new brigade for three years and became brigade adjutant and was promoted to captain. That year he was awarded the Military Cross. Returning from Salonica he went out to the front on August 10<sup>th</sup> and was killed on the 27<sup>th</sup> by a shell while reconnoitring a very forward position for a section of guns.

Deceased's commanding officer writes:-

"He had taken over the battery at a very strenuous time when I had been slightly wounded and throughout the time he was commanding behaved with the greatest gallantry and dash. The officers, N C Os and men placed thorough reliance on his leadership, which was of a very high order."

Capt Cecil's youngest brother, Rupert, Lieutenant, Bedfordshire Regiment, was killed in July,1915, his eldest brother, Randall, lieutenant R H A, was killed in December 1917 and his second brother, Capt. Victor Cecil, Hampshire Regiment has been twice severely wounded.

"On Nov. 30<sup>th</sup> and Dec.1<sup>st</sup> there was very heavy fighting in a village recently captured from the Germans when your son's trench mortars were put out of action. He very gallantly went to the assistance of the infantry who were hard pressed, and was given the command of a company. On the Saturday the village was shelled with extreme violence and a shell practically hit your son (his men report) killing him instantly.'

The letter adds that all are grieved as he was well known as a very gallant and capable officer, while many knew him as a charming friend and companion."

Capt. Cecil, who had been living in the Dominions, came over with the Canadians and was subsequently given a commission in an English regiment. He was born in 1869 and leaves a widow. Lieutenant Edward Cecil, Bedfordshire Regt, fourth son of the Bishop of Exeter and Lady Florence Cecil, was killed in action was killed in action in July 1916, and their second son, Lieutenant Victor Alexander has been twice wounded

LONDON, July 30.—Second Lieutenant Randle William Gascoyne Cecil, eldest son of the Rev. Lord William Cecil, and grandson of the celebrated Marquis of Salisbury, who married Miss Dorothy Jannaway, obtained a divorce yesterday. Eric Vigers was cited as co-respondent. 

A Good many men were stunned and confused by the explosion, but your son remained cool." 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieut. Cecil rowed in the Torpid at Oxford and was keenly interested in bell ringing. His three brothers all now (1916) on active service.......

the Rev. G.K.A. Bell, Chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Organist and Choir gave of their best for this lovely service. The ringers remembered his keen interest in the Belfry and rang a muffled peal to his memory.

### Rupert Edward Gascoyne-Cecil

News has been received that the Rector's youngest son, Lieutenant Rupert Cecil, was killed in action on Sunday July 11<sup>th</sup>. That evening the enemy exploded a mine in the front trench which was, at the time, in his charge. He tried to get up to the mine crater to his men, but as he went he was hit and killed instantly. Anyone who knows what the explosion of a mine means will admire this coolness and courage on his part. But that was all in keeping with his whole character. To human eyes his seems perhaps a short life, yet his twenty years were twenty years of usefulness: for he was one of those blameless ones who strengthen those around them wherever they go.

As a Church worker, too, he made his usefulness felt in the parish. To this the bell-ringers will bear witness: when at home he was seldom absent from the ringers' floor on Sundays or on practice nights. And now his death for his country comes as the crowning act of usefulness. He has gone as one more from Hatfield into that band of great ones who have not shrunk from spending and being spent for others. C.T.T. Wood

Dear Sir,

On Active Service

July 15<sup>th</sup> 1915

You will have heard, before this reaches you, the sad news about your son,  $2^{nd}$  Lieut. R.E.G. Cecil. I am writing to try and express my very sincere sympathy, and that of all ranks of the Battalion, and to give you a few details as to what occurred. About 7.15 p.m. last night the Germans exploded a mine near our front trenches and at the same time opened artillery fire and a certain amount of rifle fire on the trenches near the mine. Your son was shot through the head, either by shrapnel or rifle bullet, and death was practically instantaneous and painless. He is to be buried this afternoon near Ypres-Cominis railway line (about a mile from the former place) where a number of officers and men have been buried. The Rev. Fitch, Chaplain to the 15<sup>th</sup> Brigade, has been asked to conduct the funeral service. Your son was only with us, unfortunately, for a very short time but he had endeared himself to all who knew him by his cheerfulness and soldierly qualities. With deepest sympathy

Dear Sir,

July 12<sup>th</sup>

I am very sorry to have to inform you that your son Rupert was killed in action yesterday. The Germans exploded a very large mine between our two trenches about 7.15 pm., and then shelled us heavily. On hearing the explosion your son immediately tried to get up to the fire trench of which he was in charge, but unfortunately he was struck on the head by a fragment of shell and was killed instantaneously. He is to be buried this afternoon at the Brigade Headquarters, where there is a small cemetery for officers and men, at 4 O'clock. The Brigade Chaplain, the Rev. Fitch, is officiating. I knew your son at Dovercourt, and I have been in charge of the company which he was in, for a few days since Captain Tollemache was admitted to hospital. He has always been beloved by all his fellow officers, and above all by his men, who had a great respect for him. We all feel the loss which the Regiment has sustained by his death, but we are proud he was doing his duty so nobly when he was killed. A good many men were stunned and confused by the explosion, but your son remained cool, and as I have already told you, he met his death going to his post............

Please accept my deepest sympathy in the great loss you have sustained. Yours sincerely, J.C. Curtis

July 15<sup>th</sup> .......I was Lieut. Cecil's servant and was in his presence till five minutes before he was killed; he was hit in the head and passed away immediately. I must mention your son will always be missed by us all, and we hope that you will accept our deepest sympathy. He is to be buried about 1½ miles from where he was hit; a wooden cross was placed on his grave with the following words inscribed:-

R.I.P Lt, R. E. G. Cecil, 1<sup>st</sup> Bedfordshire Regt, Killed inaction, July 11<sup>th</sup> '15

I must say that no one could have wished to have a better officer than Lieut. Cecil. Several of us, including myself were in his Company at Dovercourt....... Yours respectfully, Pte. John A Lawrence

Rupert Edward was born in Hatfield, Hertfordshire, the fourth son of The Revd Lord William Rupert Ernest Gascoyne-Cecil, a son of 3rd Marquis of Salisbury, and his wife Lady Florence Mary Booth Wilbraham, a daughter of 1st Earl of Lathom. His father was Rector of Hatfield and, from 1916-36, the Bishop of Exeter.

Educated at Westminster, he was up at Christ Church 1913-1914. During that year he rowed in the Torpids and was a keen campanologist. His name appears on the list of The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers memorial

He joined the Public School Corps on the outbreak of war in August 1914 and obtained his commission in the 4th Bedfordshire Regiment on the 15th August, serving in France and Belgium.

He was killed in action near Ypres, on 11 July 1915 during a bombardment following the blowing up of a very large mine between the trenches by the Germans. He was buried close to the Ypres-Cominis Line in the Brigade Headquarters cemetery at the Railway Dugouts Burial Ground.

His commanding officer wrote "Your son was only with us, unfortunately, for a very short time, but he had endeared himself to all who knew him by his cheerfulness and soldierly qualities." Captain Curtis also wrote "The Germans exploded a very large mine between two of our trenches about 7.15.p.m. and then shelled us, heavily. On hearing the explosion, your son immediately tried to get up to the fire trench of which he was in charge, but unfortunately he was struck on the head by a fragment of shell and was killed instantaneously. He was always beloved by all his fellow officers and above all by his men who had a great respect for him. We all feel the loss which the regiment has sustained by his death but we are proud he was doing his duty so nobly when he was killed. A good many men were stunned and confused by the explosion, but your son remained cool and met his death going to post."

Two of his three brothers were killed in action.

## Stained Glass Memorial at St Etheldreda's Church

Christopher Whall designed the memorial window on the north wall of the nave near to the porch. The window is dedicated to the memory of three of the Cecil family and the inscription reads "TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND IN MEMORY OF RUPERT EDWARD GASCOYNE CECIL BORN JANY 20TH 1895 KILLED IN ACTION JULY

11 1915 AND OF RANDLE WILLIAM GASCOYNE CECIL BORN NOVR 28TH 1889 KILLED IN ACTION DECR 1ST 1917 AND OF JOHN ARTHUR GASCOYNE CECIL BORN MARCH 28TH 1893 KILLED IN ACTION AUGUST 27TH 1918 I LOOK FOR THE RESURRECTION OF THE DEAD AND THE LIFE OF THE WORLD TO COME".

The window consists of three lights. The window was presented in 1920 by James, Fourth Marquess of Salisbury, in memory of his three nephews. Their father was Lord William Cecil, then Bishop of Exeter who had previously been rector at Hatfield. The three angels in the work represent "Trial and Sacrifice" (crown of thorns), "Victory and triumph" (resurrection and torch) and "Christian Duty" (baptism of the infant). The red seraphim in the tracery above represent "Divine Love" and the blue seraphim represent "Divine Wikipedia & UK Inventory of War Memorials

Pte J E Matthews, Grenadier Guards, and Cpl T A Matthews, Beds Regiment, two brothers of Mrs Chandler, joined the army early in the war and the former laid down his life for his country. The latter is now serving in France (T A Matthews survived the war).

First among the fallen, must we mourn the loss of Lieut., John Church, who had he been spared promises well to have taken a leading position in the country and local affairs, which his father fills today. We quote an extract from a letter of the acting C.O. to show what estimate had been made of him by one who was singularly fitted to judge.

"And here is fitting place for me to chronicle the admiration, respect, and affection I feel for a man who showed himself by his gallant bearing and resource an officer and a gentleman of the highest quality and efficiency. To

have had such a comrade as Church during three or four of the most trying days of my war experience was indeed a stroke of good fortune........I hope the day will come when I can take him by the hand and tell him face to face what I have written here......Let me note of the conduct of the men. They were simply superb. Of those who did especially well, Christie, Church and Gripper, were the most distinguished. Church did wonders. From a letter written April 16<sup>th</sup> by a N.C.O. "You can be sure, Mrs Church that he died a painless death after a week or more of heroic effort, for his example and work were the talk of the survivors; ask who you will, Lieut. Church was a hero and that his end should come on the last of ten or eleven trying days makes the tragedy more acute to bear".

Only one real regret for such a life is that he leaves no son to carry on his name.

The Military Medal **(MM)** was (until 1993) a military decoration awarded to personnel of the British Army and other services, and formerly also to personnel of other Commonwealth countries, below commissioned rank, for bravery in battle on land.

The medal was established on 25 March 1916. It was the other ranks' equivalent to the Military Cross (MC), which was awarded to commissioned officers and rarely to Warrant Officers, although WOs could also be awarded the MM. The MM ranked below the MC and the Distinguished Conduct Medal, which was also awarded to non-commissioned members of the Army, in order of precedence. Recipients of the Military Medal are entitled to use the post-nominal letters "MM". In 1993, the Military Medal was discontinued, and since then the Military Cross has been awarded to personnel of all ranks.

Mr & Mrs Davis of 10 Primrose Cottages, Hatfield have been informed of the death of their second son Private William G Davis of the Canadian Regt. who was killed in action during an engagement on Sept. 17<sup>th</sup>.

Pte W Davis who was in his 24<sup>th</sup> year "signed up" in Canada in October last in the Mounted Rifles afterwards being sent to England in May 1916 and was stationed in Shorncliffe (?). Having been transferred to 70<sup>th</sup> Bat. Infantry Reg. After a stay there of 6 weeks he was drafted to France. Last Wednesday the following letter was received by his parents

"France, September 23. Dear Madam I deeply regret to have to tell you the sad news of the death of your son Pte William G Davis of this battalion who was killed in action on September 17<sup>th</sup>. He met the death of a great man and a soldier whilst in the performance of his duty in the ...... Of Almighty God he was spared all pain and suffering and the end was instantaneous. I regret that we cannot tell the exact spot where he is buried in the battlefield owing to the confusion of shelling it was impossible to mark the graves of our lads. We can only leave his soul in the hands of God knowing that he rests in the Saviour's loving care. May I extent to you the battalion's deep sympathy. He was a splendid chap, well-liked by all, esteemed as a good comrade and a good soldier. I pray God will comfort you in these sad days.

Private Thomas George Dodds ASC.MT, elder son of Mr and Mrs T G Dodds of Park Street, Hatfield, was killed in France on the morning of August 30<sup>th</sup> by a splinter from an enemy shell which struck him on the head. He died almost immediately without regaining consciousness. From a letter received from a comrade who was in the lorry at the time, it seems they were returning from the front line after delivering supplies when he met his death.

His comrade states: - "It came upon us as a severe shock and to myself doubly so. We have been together through varying changes of fortune during the last year and I have ever found him a cheerful mate and loyal pal." Private Dodds was 27 years of age, joined the army in January 1915 and has been in France since June of the same year. He was expected to be in England very shortly when he was to have been married. Much sympathy is felt for his parents, who are well-known and respected in Hatfield, and for his fiancée.







"No doubt by this time you will have head from the War Office respecting your friend's death, Lance-Cpl. James Walker Gittings, on the 20/7/16. He was shot in the head by a German sniper, and he died immediately. His remains were buried in the British Cemetery on the Rue de Bois, near Festubert, and a cross has been placed over his grave. I should like to mention that he was a great friend of mine ever since he joined the Machine Gun Section, and I shall miss him very much. He was always cheerful and ready to do anything. Only a few days previous he did some good work with the gun by repelling a bombing attack made by the Germans, and his death has caused a gap in the Section which I am afraid it will be hard to fill. The whole of the Section and myself deeply sympathise with you in your sad loss, and it may be some consolation to you to know that he died a hero's death, fighting for his country Cpl. Johnstone



He was very much liked by everyone in the section. Your son went out on a job wiring the front line; everything went well until the work was nearly finished when he was hit by a machine gun bullet in the chest. He was carried down to the aid post by stretcher bearers and though suffering some pain bore it bravely......he sent back a message "Tell the boys I feel a bit groggy but will write them for certain from Blighty", but he died about two hours later after reaching the dressing station: Your son was buried at the British Military Cemetery at Acheux and we are making a cross for the grave which will be fixed in a few days".

Much sympathy is felt for Mr and Mrs John Gregory of Park Street, Hatfield in the loss that they have sustained by the death of their only son, Harry Gregory of the Honourable Artillery Company who was killed in action on February 8<sup>th</sup>. The sad news arrived from the War Office on Thursday last and letters have been received from comrades of the dead soldier confirming it.

Pte H Gregory enlisted in November 1915 and went to the front on November 18<sup>th</sup> 1916 and therefore had been abroad only three months. Whilst in England he had the rank of corporal but when sent to France he reverted

to the rank of private. It appears that he was on sentry duty alternately with a comrade and was sleeping prior to taking his turn when a shell burst and killed both of them.

Before enlistment Private Gregory was employed with his father in the grocery business in Park Street Hatfield. Possessed of a considerable talent as a humorous vocalist, he was a good deal in demand and had many friends in Hatfield and neighbourhood. He was also closely identified with cricket, football and tennis and in that connection enjoyed a good deal of popularity. He was thirty years of age. Many letters of sympathy and admiration have reached the bereaved parents.

A comrade who was with Private Gregory at the time he met his death writes to Mr Gregory describing the circumstances. He states that Private Gregory was killed instantly and while asleep. "Our regiment", he writes "had advanced and took a road line of German fighters (????). We got .....(?) and secured our position and beat off a counter-attack. The very next day we were subjected to a very heavy shell-fire. The only cover we had was provided by shell holes which we had to dig deeply and build parapets round. On Thursday night your son and I were in the same shell-hole on guard with two other men. About ten o'clock at night a shell burst in our fort killed the man on sentry duty and your son (who was next on duty and asleep at the time). Wounded the other man and buried me. I cannot tell you how I feel your son's death. We had always been close friends since we joined. The last day we spent entirely together, we took our meals together in a shell-hole and what little sleep we could during the day. We, the men who knew him, are very sorry as he was a cheerful companion and true friend. Those that remain of his section wish me to convey their deepest sympathy in your affliction."

Another private in the deceased's section, in a letter to Mr and Mrs Gregory, states that Private Gregory's death is a great loss to the section and the members feel it very much. "I much appreciate his good comradeship and always ready willingness to help on all occasions. The Fates were kind to me in the fact that after working hard for two whole nights together, digging ourselves in, making a thin very shallow trench deeper so that we had some sort of cover, a shell burst on the parapet and I was almost completely buried. Gregory was close to me but ......and worked away and got me out again. I was put out of action though and had to go down to a field hospital for a couple of days and when I shook hands and we wished one another good luck I little thought it would be for the last time. It was two days afterwards when an advance had been made that he was mortally hit with a shell.

Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Hill of 7 Union Lane, Hatfield, have received notification of the death of their only son, Sergt. Wm. Alfred Hill, Herts. Regt, who was wounded on July 10<sup>th</sup> and died the following day without regaining consciousness. From letters received from Capt Moore and from the Chaplain (Rev. A W Gibbs) it appears that Sergt. Hill received his wound from a machine gun bullet when on patrol. At the same time the officer in charge and several others were wounded. Capt Moore speaks of him as "A, N C O beloved of all ranks and a brave soldier who met his death facing the enemy, as becomes a soldier." He was buried by his comrades, many of whom belonged to Hatfield. Sergt. Hill who was 25 years of age, was employed in the gardens of Colworth House, Charnbrook. He joined the 6<sup>th</sup> Beds in August 1914 and had seen three years' service in France. He was wounded in April last and on returning to duty two months ago was transferred to the Herts. Regt. The occasion when he met his death was his first duty in the front line since convalescence.

Great feelings shown for Mr and Mrs Humphreys who are helped in their sorrow by full knowledge of the last moments of their son, received from the Chaplin: Trooper Humphreys was tenderly cared for up to the end.

Herts Mercury. Sept 1915: Herts Yeomanry Man Dies of Wounds: Mr and Mrs Humphreys of Goldings Dairy received intimation from the Commanding Officer of the Eastern division at the War Office on Monday morning that their son Sidney a trooper in 'D' Squadron of the Herts Yeomanry, died from wounds on August 23, which he received in the recent fighting in Gallipoli. Trooper Sidney Humphreys, who was only 23 years old, was their youngest son and joined the Yeomanry with two others of his close friends a few days before the regiment sailed for Egypt. He had served as an apprentice at Messers Gray and Sons, Coach Builders and was well up in all motor car and electrical work when he left England. A straight forward honest workman and a dutiful son, his loss will be severely felt by his parents and relatives for whom much sympathy is felt. He was a useful member of the Hatfield Fire Brigade. He represented the fourth generation of the family in the Herts Yeomanry, his Great Grandfather having joined the regiment in 1830

**Wikipedia:** On 30 December 1915, Natal was lying in the Cromarty Firth with her squadron, under the command of Captain Eric Back. The captain was hosting a film party on board and had invited the wives and children of his officers, one civilian friend and his family, and nurses from the nearby hospital ship 'Drina' to attend. A total of seven women, one civilian male, and three children were in attendance that afternoon. Shortly after 15:25, and without warning, a series of violent explosions tore through the rear part of the ship. She capsized five minutes later. Some thought that she'd been torpedoed by a German U-boat or detonated a submarine-laid mine, but examination of the wreckage revealed that the explosions were internal. The divers sent to investigate the ship reported that the explosions began in either the rear 9.2-inch shell room or the 3-pounder and small arms magazine. The Admiralty court-martial in the causes of her loss concluded that it was caused by an internal ammunition explosion, possibly due to faulty cordite. The Admiralty issued a revised list of the dead and missing that totalled 390 in January 1916, but did not list the women and children on board that day. Losses are listed from 390 to 421.

Indeed, in the latter part of the war, as tactics changed to defence in depth, it commonly served well in advance of the front line. It had a less enviable record for its casualty rate. Some 170,500 officers and

men served in the MGC with 62,049 becoming casualties, including 12,498 killed, earning it the nickname 'The Suicide Club'.







He joined the army in October 1914, had been in France for over two years and had been twice wounded. His last leave was towards the close of last year and he returned to France on Christmas Day. Captain Campbell in a letter to the relatives states that Private Mardle was killed instantaneously while he was doing his duty like a good soldier. It may comfort you a little to think that not many can give his life better than your son did and I am certain he gave it willingly in the service of his country".

Acting Bombardier F Mardle, R F A - Killed in Action — Eloquent Tribute from Commanding Officer Another member of our "patriotic family" has unfortunately been called upon to make the supreme sacrifice in the cause of right and his friends are left to mourn the loss of one who always had before him a high sense of duty and did not shrink from putting it into effect no matter at what risk. We refer to Acting Bombardier Frank Mardle, of D Battery 5<sup>th</sup> Brigade, R F A, son of Mrs Mardle of Cromer Hyde, Hatfield and half-brother of Mr Geo Smart of Abbey Mill Lane, St Albans. It was on Saturday last that Mrs Mardle received the sad news that her son had been killed in action on the morning of Sunday June 11th. The N C O and men of the Battery

conveyed their sympathy and their regret at the loss of "a good N C O who was liked by the whole of the Battery".

Fuller particulars of the accident and a splendid tribute to the gallantry of Acting Bombardier were contained in a letter received by Mrs Smart from the Officer Commanding his Battery, who wrote: "We are on a part of the front where there has been heavy fighting during the last fortnight. Through it all we have had to shoot the guns and carry ammunition practically all day and night, never getting more than about two or three hours sleep. Practically all the time from the 2<sup>nd</sup> to the 11<sup>th</sup> June the day he was killed your brother did sterling work with never a thought of complaining and setting an example to the rest of the men working his gun which was excellent, and really the work they had to do was more than one was warranted to expect from men. Then, while almost at the muzzle of the gun pieces flew back into the gun pit, two large ones piercing the shield. Your brother was 'laying' at the time and pulled the trigger. The firing of the gun and burst of the shell were practically instantaneous. One large piece went right into the right side of the neck, and he was hit in several other places. He just fell on his back and died within a minute, never being conscious. I am sure he felt absolutely nothing because the expression on his face was so peaceful and quiet. Two other men were wounded at the same time. I have no hesitation in saying your brother was one of the nicest, best and most efficient men in the battery. That's no exaggeration at all. We miss him very much in every way, and I shall find his place very difficult to fill. We buried him in a cemetery just in front of the battery and are making a cross to put up over his grave. I write to you myself, being the officer in command of the action in which Mardle was and beg you to accept on behalf of the other officers and myself and all N C Os and men of the battery our deepest sympathy with you in your loss.

Writing to Mrs Mardle in reference to her son, the Sergeant states "I am very, very sorry to have to write to you about your very brave son, Frank Mardle. He was not only my pal but the most popular man in the whole battery. He died at his post doing his duty which he never failed to do well. I can assure you every man in the battery has the deepest sympathy for you in your great loss. He will be missed by us all."

On the same day as that on which the sad news of Mardle's death arrived Mr Smart received from his half-brother a letter in the course of which he wrote "We are in action again, same place and have had the most exciting time since we came out here. We relieved another battery last Tuesday week and it was fairly quiet until Friday. Fritz started shelling our trenches about nine o'clock last Friday morning and from until about midnight Sunday we were at it night and day. In fact we have not had a decent sleep since, as we have had to replenish our ammunition store in readiness for another attack. We were firing so fast that ammunition had to be brought up in daylight and Fritz was shelling the roads heavily at the time. The shells fell all round us but luckily nobody at the guns was hit. We had two direct on our pit but were so busy sending them over we took no notice at the time. The guns got so hot that the paint peeled off the muzzle. The Germans got into our frontline trenches, but suffered very heavy losses in doing so. Fritz paid very dearly for the little ground he gained and we are still worrying him. I am expecting to be relieved for a rest at the week-end but would rather stay here if there is anything doing.

## **Distinguished Conduct Medal:** (From Wikipedia)

The Distinguished Conduct Medal (DCM) was (until 1993) an extremely high level award for bravery. It was a second level military decoration awarded to other ranks of the British Army and formerly also to non-commissioned personnel of other Commonwealth countries.

The medal was instituted in 1854, during the Crimean War, to recognize gallantry within the other ranks, for which it was equivalent of the Distinguished Service Order (DSO) awarded for bravery to commissioned officers, but the DCM ranked well below the DSO in precedence.

Although considered to be the army's second ranking gallantry award, the DCM was almost always seen as a "near miss for the VC". From 1942, members of the Navy and Air Force were entitled to the award. In the aftermath of the 1993 review of the honours system, as part of the drive to remove distinctions of rank in awards for bravery, the DCM was discontinued (along with the award of the DSO specifically for gallantry

and of the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal). These three decorations were replaced by the Conspicuous Gallantry Cross, which now serves as the second level award for gallantry for all ranks across the whole armed forces. Bars were awarded to the DCM in recognition of the performance of further acts of gallantry meriting the award. Recipients are entitled to the post-nominal letters DCM.

#### Herts. Advertiser, 29.9.17: Decorations for Hatfield Soldiers:

Mr & Mrs F Osborn of New Town have received news that their third son, Stephen, of the Herts. Reg. has been awarded the D C M for bravery in action at St Julien on July 31<sup>st</sup>. In a very modest letter to his parents telling them of his "luck", he says. "When all the officers had fallen our wounded RSM handed over the remnants of the Battalion to me. I being the only Sgt left in the firing line at the time". Osborn brought this gallant remnant back to safety. Sgt Osborn joined the Herts. Regiment in 1904 and went out with it in Nov. 1914 and has been in every engagement the regiment has fought and fortunately came through without a scratch.

I hope that is will be some small consolation to you to know that he died as he had lived doing his duty bravely with his face to the foe. We all miss him very much and I know everyone must do who had come in contact with him. As you must know he was thought of very highly of by every officer N.C.O. and man in the Regt. Trusting that God will be with you and comfort you in your great trouble. Believe me yours sincerely G. Northrope, Compy. Sgt. Major, No 1 Company.

### "Dear Mrs Osborne,

I write to you to extend to you the very deepest of my sympathy from the bottom of my heart in your great loss, namely your Husband who died from a wound from a machine gun on the night of Oct 28<sup>th</sup>. It is one of the greatest blows I have received since I have been out here, he was my Platoon Sergt. and was quite invaluable in his position, and his D.C.M. was earned many times over. I was not with him when he was hit I am sorry to say as I was not with my Platoon being in charge of the Company. Your Husband and I spent many hours together and he never failed in the lines or out of it and was Platoon Sgt., and I took more interest in his men as regards to their comfort and efficiency in every way. I always felt confident with the Platoon in his hands. What you must feel, as I do, is the hard luck after his long time out here, and I know what sorrow has

come into his family since the war broke out......No man could have died a finer death, your Husband did not suffer and died half an hour after his wound, and you can be assured everything in our power was done for him, and never a complaint came from his lips...... Yours sincerely

Missing – Words cannot express how much warm feeling there is for the parents of the "missing", Mr. and Mrs. V. Austen, Mr and Mrs. Page, and Mr. and Mrs. Panter. One realizes what the anxiety must be while waiting for the news. We pray with them that this longed-for news may soon come and that they may yet hear that their sons are safe and sound"

**HMS Defence** was a Minotaur-class armoured cruiser built for the Royal Navy in the mid-1900s. She was the last armoured cruiser built for the Royal Navy. She was stationed in the Mediterranean when the First World War began and participated in the pursuit of the German battle cruiser SMS Goeben and light cruiser SMS Breslau. Defence was transferred to the Grand Fleet in January 1915 and remained there for the rest of her career. Defence was sunk on 31 May 1916 during the Battle of Jutland,

the largest naval battle of the war. Escorting the main body of the Grand Fleet, the ship was fired upon by one German battle cruiser and four dreadnoughts as she attempted to engage a disabled German light cruiser. She was struck by two salvoes from the German ships that detonated her rear magazine. The fire from that explosion spread to the ship's secondary magazines, which exploded in turn. There were no survivors. (Wikipedia)

'a good fight,' and though we are termed the silent Navy, there is nothing on this earth that is so active, including, of course, the sea in the word 'earth.' There are things taking place every day all for the benefit of the country which must be kept secret from our public to prevent our enemies from knowing; and, as a parting word, if only our public could be made to see and think it over that their food which they consume every day has to be escorted safely into port by 'Our Silent Navy,' I don't, think they would worry so much about us, thereby disturbing the gentlemen who 'pull the strings.' Now I must close this short note, hoping the best of health is being enjoyed by all. I should like to send my best wishes for a happy Xmas and bright and prosperous New Year and the best of luck to all the boys of Hatfield serving the colours.....


#### Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine July 1916:

Hatfield Roll of Honour - Killed in Action - Cecil Parker. Though our great naval victory thrilled every breast with pride in the achievements of our splendid Navy when once the full value of their triumph was properly understood, yet there are, alas, many sad hearts breast of those they loved well by the loss of the "Defence" the "Queen Mary" and other ships. Amongst the bereaved, for whom very great sympathy is felt is Mrs Panter of Newtown whose gallant son Cecil went down in H.M.S. "Defence". We quote a private letter lately received to show how fine a deed was shared in by all on board this ship. "News comes in from various quarters telling of the splendid conduct of those three small ships the "Defence" "Black Prince" and "Warrior". The Flag-Ship "Defence" went knowingly – leading the way- to almost certain destruction to save a critical situation. This they achieved before the two former ships sank. I do not know whether all the details will appear, but this is what happened". - Is not such a death worthy of all thankfulness? May the sad Mother and sisters be helped to feel it so.





He leaves a widow and four children. He was buried with full military honours at Hatfield by the 1/11 Battalion London Regiment. The cortege moved off from Hatfield Station at 1.30 in the following order: - The Firing Party under Sergt. Carter, the Band and bugles, under Bugle Major Rose: and a large detachment under Sergt. Sayer. The Band rendered during the march to the church the "Dead March" in "Saul" and the hymn tune "Abide with me". Then followed the coffin with eight pall-bearers, and mourners. Mrs Parrot (widow) was supported by Mr G Parrot (brother), deceased's mother and father, Mr and Mrs Bert Parrot, Pte Charles Parrot of the 1<sup>st</sup> Herts. and members of the 1/10<sup>th</sup> London and 1/11<sup>th</sup> London Regiments. Upon reaching the church, Canon the Rev. Lord William Gascoyne-Cecil M A held a short service, assisted by the Rev. G F Baxter, M A. The procession was then re-formed for the last journey to the grave. The Rev. Lord William Cecil carried out the last rites, delivering a short address to the mourners, which was followed by three shots being fired over the grave by the firing party and the "Last Post" was sounded by the buglers of the 1/11<sup>th</sup> London Regt. There was a wreath in the form of a large glass globe through the efforts of Mrs Lawrence – Mrs W J Parrot and the family hope that all kind friends will accept their heartfelt thanks for the great kindness and sympathy shown to them during their bereavement.

Service Record: British Army WWI Service Records, 1914-1920: William Joseph Perkins, family lived at Westfield Lodge, Hatfield, William according to his army record was born in Luton, Bedfordshire. He enlisted into the Public Schools Battalion, Middlesex Regt. on 25/5/1915 aged 22yrs 10mth, at Woldingham, Surrey. William was 5ft 10inchs tall, 11st. 5lbs. with good physical development, he had been vaccinated as a child and had a scar around his neck from a childhood operation. Next of kin was his Father Henry Perkins, also mentioned were William's four sisters, Florence 21, Hilda 19, Winifred, 14 & Doris 10. William was educated at an Industrial School under Home Office or local Government Board. On enlisting William's rank was a Private, he was appointed Lance Corporal 6/6/1916. William was wounded in action 1/7/16 and was sent to home to recover. While at home he caught influenza but recovered to return to France at the end of 1916. He returned home once more between 30/6/1918 – 30/9/18. William died 24/10/18. William's father received his medals and effects. A letter was sent to his father explaining the need to exhume and move his body to Montay-Neuvilly Road British Cemetery (See next page)

**1901 Census:** A Henry and Emma Perkins are living at Denham Stables, West End, Totteridge. Henry is a domestic coachman. They have 4 children, Mary aged 10, William, aged 8, Florence aged 3 and Hilda aged 1. William was born in Markyate, Herts

**1911 Census:** At this date William aged 19 is not living with his parents, but is employed as a footman at, 7 Carlos Place, W. London, Mayfair/Knightsbridge. This William was born in Markyate, Beds. His parents Henry and Emma Perkins are now living at Hertingfordbury. Henry is still a domestic coachman. They have 4 daughters living with them, Florence aged 12, Hilda aged 11, Winifred aged 6, and Doris aged 2.

There are discrepancies between William's army record and the census information as to where William was born and the ages of his sisters.

His father was a clerk. He lived at Roe Green, Hatfield. He left school to become an accountant. He was a Lieutenant in the 7<sup>th</sup> Leicestershire Regiment. Hubert died of wounds on active service at Loos, France, on 14<sup>th</sup> November 1915, aged 22. He is buried in the Meriville Communal Cemetery, France, Plot 5, Row B, Grave 20.

Then he was transferred to the Machine Gun Corp, no 71084. William was, 23yrs 10mths old when he enlisted. He had been living at Wildhill, Woodside, Hatfield, but had been born in Bedon, Suffolk. His trade was a groom/gardener. He was in good health with brown eyes and light brown hair. William had previously served for 2yrs in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion Norfolk Regt. William was attested a Private on 04/09/1914 and posted on 09/09.1914. He did not seem to settle to army life. During 1916 he was admitted several times to the field ambulance but each time returned to duty. On 04/09/1916 he was granted a Class 2 proficiency badge and in Dec 1916 was transferred to the Machine Gun Corps. William was on leave in UK between 06/01/1917 and 16/01/1917. On 20/06/1917 William was on a charge and deprived of a day's pay for having a dirty canteen on inspection. William was killed in action 12/10/17. Medals and effects were sent to his next of kin, his parents, Edward & Emma Plume of Rose Cottage, Banningham, Aylsham, Norfolk.



Please remember me to Mr Spencer and tell him I will write at the first opportunity.

I had a nice letter from Mr Gravestock last week.

Well dear Mother and Father I often think and wonder when or whether I shall have the luck of coming back again to see you all, which I am hoping every day to do so, but never mind only time will tell.

The weather here is splendid, plenty of fruit this season.

Well I must close wishing you all the best of luck and health, hoping to hear from you soon.

# **Bishop's Hatfield parish Magazine, July 1915**: Extracts from Letters from the Front. *May 1915,*

I hope you all enjoyed yourself at Whitsun, as I thought about you all. I am sure and wished I were with you again, it did not seem like a holiday to us although we were out of the trenches, but I must say we had a rough time before that and thank God I am spared through it all, as it was terrible. We made two advances and captured the German trenches, but it cost a lot of lives for though we were under shell fire for ten days and I must say it was enough to drive a fellow mad as they were so deadly; it was a sight to see our chaps blown to pieces. I shall never forget it, what few of us were left thought ourselves lucky. It is cruel when the beasts use that gas, as it is an awful death to have. We are all issued with gags to cover our mouths with, it helps us to overcome the strength of it and stand our ground. Generals French and Joffe came to inspect us on behalf of the good work we have done lately the other day and I saw the Prince of Wales sometime back. I expect you wondered why I have not written to you before the last letter which I hope you got on Whit Monday, but I could not as we were engaged and we cannot write then. I think we are having another go shortly. How I wish the War was over but the more we kill the more seem to come up, where they come from beats me. I was glad to see Italy start as it will shorten it a bit. I only wish I come out of it safely so that I can come home to you all again. I generally dream that I am home and then wake up and find myself here it makes me wild then......Pray for me Mum when you go to Church for my safety, but if I die I die with a good heart to know that I love my Mother and Father dearly Thomas Pollard



He fought in many sectors of the Western Front and during the fierce conflict at St Julien was killed in action on July 31<sup>st</sup> 1917. He was entitled to the General Service and Victory Medal.

**Medal Card:** Awarded the Victory medal and British War Medal.

**1881 Census:** Robert, age 3, is living with his parents Thomas and Ann and siblings in Back Street, Hatfield. Father, Thomas, is working as a carman.

**1911 Census:** Robert, age 33 and unmarried is living with his widowed Mother, Ann, and brother at 6, Primrose Cottages, Hatfield. Robert is working as a carman on estate.

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine September 1917:** Hatfield Roll of Honour: This issue of the magazine is of necessity a sad one owing to the large number of casualties incurred by Hertfordshire in the glorious action at St Julien, in which all the officers of the 1<sup>st</sup> Herts. were killed or wounded and a heavy toll in life of the men under them was taken. ........... We have however to mourn the loss of seven brave men: One Robert Putterill, R.A.M.C. ....... Concerning the death of Robert Putterill, we learn that he lost his life while bringing in the wounded under heavy shell fire.

#### Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine, November 1917:

6<sup>th</sup> Royal Berks. B.E.F

"Dear Mrs Putterill, It is with sincere regret that I have to inform you of the death of your son while serving with us as a stretcher bearer. He was a son to be proud of, and on that day (July 31) he had been carrying the wounded all day under the most dangerous conditions. Late in the afternoon he was hit by a shell while

carrying back a badly wounded man and killed instantly. I cannot speak highly enough of your son or express in words my own deep regret at his loss, which regret is shared by us all.

Dear Mr Randall, I very much regret to inform you that today we lost your son, Corporal Randall. He was killed by a shell when out for a walk two miles behind the lines. It was all the more sad because he has been six weeks at work in the front line trenches, and had done excellent work. He was a most excellent N.C.O in every way and a most gallant man, and the whole squadron mourns one of their best comrades. I have arranged for all his personal effects to be sent to you by registered post. He will be buried tomorrow in the British Cemetery, Vermelles, and a cross put up and flowers planted and though my loss is but a trifle compared with yours, yet I mourn sincerely the loss of one o my best N.C.O.s, and that of a gallant man.

**1901 Census:** Geoffrey, age 13, is at preparatory school at St. Peter's on the Isle of Thanet, Kent. **1911 Census:** Geoffrey, age 23, is back at home with his family in Feeing, Essex. Father, Percy is a farmer/brewer. Geoffrey is working as a brewer.

**Bishop's Hatfield Parish Magazine September 1914:** 1st List of Men Mobilised from Hatfield – *Reid, Geoffrey P N – Brewery – Lieut. Essex Yeomanry.* 

**Pryor Reid Brewery, Hatfield:** Owned by the Reid family, Geoffrey was probably working at the Brewery when war was declared.

**Excerpt from 'History of the Hatfield Brewery', by Brian Lawrence** - All too soon with the outbreak of the First World War, the established way of life which had developed in this country during the Victorian age was totally disrupted and the inhabitants of Hatfield and the employees of the Brewery were all affected by these changes. Many of the staff were called to arms and among those who were destined never to return was the only son of the Chairman of the Company, Mr Percy C Reid.

There is no doubt that the closure of the brewery in 1920 came about as a direct result of this tragic event since it is recorded that at the closing dinner for all the employees, held at the One Bell, the Chairman publicly stated that he would never have thought of closing but for the death of his son. One can but speculate how differently this part of old Hatfield might have developed had the young Lieutenant Geoffrey Reid survived to fulfil his father's dream of continuing the family business. At the time of its closure the Brewery Company owned approximately a hundred public houses, in and around Hatfield and in other parts of the county, all of which were sold to Benskins of Watford



<u>Service Record:</u> British Army WW1 Pension Records 1814-1920: George Rice, according to army records, had been educated the Royal Army Asylum School obtaining a certificate of education 2<sup>nd</sup> class. He enlisted on 1/6/1886 into the Bedfordshire Regiment at the age of 18 (limited engagements). He was posted a private to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Bed. Regt. 19/11/1889, appointed drummer 25/4/1890. He extended his army service to complete 12 years with the colours on 28/4/1890. Promoted corporal 3/4/1893 but reduced to the ranks 12/06/1893, transferred to army reserve 30/6/1893 and discharged 31/05/1898.

George re-enlisted 31/08/1914 <u>apparent age 43yrs</u> and immediately posted as Sergeant. George was 5ft. 3.5 inches tall, with fresh complexion, pale grey eyes and grey hair. He had been working as a brick layer and living at 8 Primrose Cottages, Hatfield, with his wife Eliza and large family of 8 children. He was posted several times finally to the Gloucestershire Regt. 28/06/1918. He had been at home 31/8/14-28/8/1915, with the British Expeditionary Force 29/12/15-26/05/1916, and ? 27/5/1916 – 23/8/1918. He became medically unfit for war service with heart problems and was discharged on 28/08/1918. According to the medical report of invalid, George was 50yrs. His military character was very good, steady, reliable, hardworking, sober and trustworthy. The Death of Pensioner Notice shows that a sum of 22/- was awarded for the period 24/8/1918 – 03/09/1918.

National Roll of the Great War 1914-1918, Section V. Luton: Rice, George Sergeant, Bedfordshire Regiment – volunteering in August 1914, he served with his unit at various stations until drafted overseas in December 1915. He took part in several battles on the Western Front and did valuable work with his unit and was badly gassed in August 1918. Invalided home he died in the V.A.D. Hospital, Hatfield from the effects of gas poisoning in the following month. He was entitled to the 1914-15 star, General and victory Medals. 8, Primrose Cottages, Hatfield. (Being invalided out because of gas poisoning differs from George's army pension's records)

Medal Card: Awarded the 1915 Star, Victory Medal, British and War Medal.

## **Further Research:**

**1871 Census:** There is a George Rice, age 3, living in Union Lane, Hatfield, he is (apparently) the adopted son of George and Caroline Holland. George Holland is an engine cleaner. The Holland's have a son of their own also called George, age 1. There is also a Matthew Rice, 43, widower, working as a railway labourer living in Newtown, Hatfield with 2 daughters and 1 son also named Matthew.

**1881 Census:** A, George Rice, age 12, a scholar, is living with his Father, Matthew, 53, a widower, in Newtown Cottages, Hatfield. Matthew, born in Louth Ireland was working as a railway labourer. (This may be the same George in the 1871 census). Looking for George and Caroline Holland in this census we find them in Clerkenwell. London, there is no George Rice living with them.

**1911 Census:** George Rice, age 40, is living with his wife Eliza and family of 8 children at 8, Primrose cottages, Hatfield. George is working as a garden labourer. His Father Matthew Rice, aged 83, is now a patient in the Workhouse in Union Lane, Hatfield.

Dagmar Hse. Memorial in St Etheldreda's Church Hatfield

21<sup>st</sup> November 1915

............As I have seen a few letters in the Parish magazine from different chaps out here I thought I would like to let you know a few of my experiences. I came out in March with........the division that was billeted around Hatfield and St Albans. On reaching France I with twenty other men, was left at the base at Havre as reinforcements. Here we spent a fairly decent time, as we were attached to the regular R.E.s for work in the numerous Camps. And so we had a good deal more freedom than some of the other corps in the Camps. I spent seven weeks at the Base, and joined my Company at the line just before the battle of Festubert, in which my Company played a big part, being right in the thick of it. I can remember

the sensation one of our section caused when they were returning from the line the next day; every man had got a Prussians Guard's helmet, and as they came into the village they all put them on. It was a sight the French people nearly went mad with delight. After Festubert we moved back and a bit further on to the right of the line on to a position recently occupied by the French. Here we were billeted in a brewery .......Here we were engaged in digging in a new trench in advance of the one occupied by us. So as to straighten up the line a bit and putting out barbed wire entanglements. While at this billet we had a few rather exciting experiences of the German shells and some narrow squeaks we had too; but luckily we had very few casualties indeed. One day in particular I remember. The Germans started shelling a little to our left, where some of our artillery were, and then they came gradually nearer to our billet. The first shell near to our billet killed ten horses, the next went into the roof of a farm building just behind; No.3 went bang clean through the roof of the billet where two minutes before about twenty of our chaps were having tea; but somehow they had all cleared out when they heard the first two shells, so no one was hit. After that we used to get a few over-nearly every day, but nearly all were wide of the billet. One night we all went out in front wiring, the Germans spotted us, and turned the machine guns on us. Down we all went as close to Mother earth as possible and it was not very pleasant to hear the bullets going ping against the wire. We waited till they stopped and then tried to get on with our work, but they would not let us. Every time we started they started the machine gun; so at last we received orders to get in as best we could. So we waited till all was quiet, and then one at a time made for the end of the gap; and we did not trouble how we went in, and right thankful we were to get in, with only two men hit and that wounded. After two months of this part of the line we received orders to take over a position from the French further to the right. Here we had to prepare a new front line again ready for the attack on Loos. In this attack we were again in the thick of it, and we gave the Germans a taste of our worth that time. Gee, you should have seen them run when we got past their first line. They properly got the wind up and hooked it, with our boys and the Jocks on our left in full pelt after them. The R.E.'s had so far to go, and then stop and to start to consolidate the position, and we had to work like very devils, as the Germans tried a counter attack; but they lost a terrible number of men and gained nothing. We are now back for a rest, the first we have had for seven months. When I say rest, it only means being away from the line, and we have to do all sorts of work. At present we are building huts. I have seen the report of the Zepps visiting England......and I am glad they did no damage to Hatfield. I am afraid the Germans have not been satisfied with the results of their much talked about Zepps. Well, now I must close, wishing all the best of luck to all in Hatfield. J. As we went to print last month the news of Gunner Alfred Smith's death had come to hand and a memorial service was held in the Parish Church on the last day of the month to commemorate a much loved choir boy. The following letter has been received by the parents of Gunner Alfred Smith will serve to sustain the character which all his friends knew him to bear. "By this letter I desire to express to you the deepest sympathy of the whole Battery at the sad loss of your son, Gun. Smith A.G., who was killed in action May 16<sup>th</sup>. It was a great blow to his friends in the Battery, as he was one of the most popular men I have in the Battery. 





**Bishops Hatfield Parish Magazine, Apr 1917:** Lemsford News – War Notes. Letters have at last been received, giving particulars of Cecil White and Christopher Wren, who lost their lives in the first months of the Somme Battle.......A Corporal from another regiment has written to Mrs Wren about her son; by some mischance the letter written in July, was only received last month. It says: "We started in the front line at half past three in the morning; during one of our halts, I was at the head of our section, I met your dear boy, gave him necessary attention until further aid came. I had to go further up the line; about an hour and a half later, we had to

retire, and we stayed just where your son was, and I went and saw how he was. Our doctor was there: he was quite cheerful at the time, and our platoon stretcher bearers took him away to a large dressing station. At night I was asked to go to the dressing station, and there your son was laid out. I took his personal belongings and we buried him in a soldier's cemetery at a place near Albert. I must tell you he was quite prepared to die; and asked me in the early morning to write to you if anything happened to him, if I came through alright. Our Captain gave me permission to write to all the Boys' people who I had anything for." It must be a great consolation to those who loved them, to know that these brave young fellows were spared prolonged suffering, and all that was possible was done for them.


